ADVERTISING ISSUED BY MANITOBA PROGRESSIVE  
CONSERVATIVE PARTY—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

CONGRATULATIONS ON SUCCESSFUL MANIPULATION OF  
CANADIAN DESIGNED ARM ABOARD UNITED STATES SPACE  
SHIP—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

**Mr. Stanley Hudecki (Hamilton West):** Madam Speaker, I rise today under the provisions of Standing Order 43 on a matter of urgent and pressing necessity. Over the weekend the second space shuttle landed, following a two-day space flight during which Canada's first major contribution to the space program was successfully tested. I refer to the Canadian government-funded remote manipulator system, better known as the Canadarm. In order that this very important project in international co-operation and space policy receive future sup-
